## Greetings from the Village President

It's hard to believe that school has started and that summer has come and gone. I hope that you have had some time to take advantage of what WFB has to offer during the summer months. The parks and beaches seem to always be filled with families, the Farmer's Market continues to grow and thrive (and will continue

through the end of September), the WFB Community Band concerts and the Civic Foundation ice cream socials draw large crowds and the Sounds of Summer, as always, was a huge success. I would be remiss if I didn't take a minute to thank all the volunteers who take the time and effort to create, organize and staff these events.

The dedication of Craig Counsell Park took place in July and was attended by many generations of current and former little leaguers. The history of the park is pure WFB. In 1977, resident Tom Rice was looking for a permanent home for the WFB little league. Through his fund raising efforts, enough money was collected to build the first fields at the former Water Tower Park. Today, the area has three fields, a permanent snack building and a very active Friends of Little League volunteer group. Rice passed away in May and was also honored at the dedication with a new flagpole named in his honor.

Finally, the Village is moving forward with plans to develop the parking lots behind the Fox Bay Building. The Mandel Group currently has a proposal working its way through all the boards and commissions to gain approval to build approximately 100 luxury apartment units. This plan will be vetted by not only the Plan Commission and the Architectural Review Board, but also by the Community Development Authority (CDA) and ultimately by the Village Board. In 2003, the CDA worked to create a master plan for the entire Silver Spring business district, envisioning what the future of this area might look like. This apartment complex fits into that master plan, which calls for a dense condo-like structure on the public parking lots. A public hearing was held in July in which residents had an opportunity to voice both their concerns regarding aspects of the project and also to show their support. Parking has come up as a concern regarding this project and the

project will maintain public parking on the current public lots, but it will now be covered. Tenants of the project will have private parking underground for themselves and their guests. Construction will be phased allowing for half the public lots to be open during construction. Information on this project can be found on our website, including drawings and a potential construction timeline.

## Holiday Trash Waste Collection

Thanksgiving Day collection for residents who normally get their trash and recycling picked up on Thursday (Nov. 22) will have it picked up TWO DAYS EARLIER on Tuesday, Nov. 20.

The day after Thanksgiving Day collection for residents who normally get their trash and recycling picked up on Friday (Nov. 23) will have it picked up TWO DAYS EARLIER on Wednesday, Nov. 21.

## Back to School Safety

Fall means that children are going back to school, and traffic safety is very important.

- Slow down in school zones.
- Watch for children crossing streets, and for directions from crossing guards.
- Be extra vigilant on streets adjacent to schools, especially at the beginning and end of school days. Watch for children darting out from between parked cars.

Fall also brings leaves changing colors, and those big attractive leaf piles that children love to play in. **Parents**, please discourage your children from playing in leaf piles on the street. Vehicle drivers may not see them, and drive through the pile. **Drivers**, please be extra vigilant around leaf piles and do not drive through them. Children may be playing in them and be covered by leaves.

## Crime Prevention Reminders

The Village, as well as surrounding communities, periodically experience thefts from vehicles and unlocked garages during late evening/early morning hours. In the majority of cases, vehicles are left unlocked, and valuables such as personal computers, golf clubs, etc. are left in plain view. The Police Department needs your help to protect you and your property. Please consider the following suggestions:

- Lock your doors; this includes the vehicles in the driveway, the service and overhead door to your garage and the doors and windows to your residence. In the vast majority of thefts and burglaries investigated by the Police Department the items taken are from unlocked homes, vehicles and garages.
- Report suspicious activity immediately. Many times while Officers are investigating a crime, citizens will report suspicious activity that likely was related to the crime being investigated. If that information had been reported immediately squads could have been dispatched to the

area and possibly located the suspect while they are committing the crime and still in the area.

- If you observe a crime in progress, be a good witness, AND call 911 immediately. Try to get a description of the persons involved including approximate age, race, height, weight, clothing description as well as color, make and license plate of any vehicle they might be driving.
- Take efforts to safeguard your property. Criminals target properties where they can commit their crimes undetected. Trimming overgrown shrubbery and installing motion sensing outdoor lights can do a lot to take away the places where criminals prefer to lurk.

## Trick-Or-Treat Safety Tips from the Red Cross

With witches, goblins, and super-heroes descending on neighborhoods across America, the American Red Cross offers parents some safety tips to help prepare their children for a safe and enjoyable trick-or-treat holiday. Halloween should be filled with surprise and enjoyment, and following some common sense practices can keep events safer and more fun.

- Walk, slither, and sneak on sidewalks, not in the street.
- Look both ways before crossing the street to check for cars, trucks, and low-flying brooms. Cross the street only at corners.
- Don't hide or cross the street between parked cars.
- Wear light-colored or reflective-type clothing so you are more visible. (And remember to put reflective

tape on bikes, skateboards, and brooms, too!)

- Plan your route and share it with your family. If possible, have an adult go with you.
- Carry a flashlight to light your way.
- Keep away from open fires and candles. (Costumes can be extremely flammable.)
- Visit homes that have the porch light on.
- Accept your treats at the door and never go into a stranger's house.
- Use face paint rather than masks or things that will cover your eyes.
- Be cautious of animals and strangers.
- Have a grown-up inspect your treats before eating. And don't eat candy if the package is already opened.

## Overnight Parking Regulations

Village ordinance prohibits overnight parking at any time between 3 and 5 am without permission or by permit. To make overnight parking requests, residents and their guests may call (414) 431-9060 or visit the Village website at [www.wfbvillage.org](http://www.wfbvillage.org). Parking is restricted to the portion of the street abutting property that is owned, rented or otherwise occupied by the requestor. Permission will be granted for up to 15 nights per call, with a maximum annual allowance of 15 nights per vehicle. Those exceeding the annual limit will be denied permission and referred to the Police Department during normal business hours to purchase a \$30 monthly overnight parking permit. Requests for overnight parking permission must be made

prior to 3 am of the current day. No parking permission will be granted during a declared Snow Emergency. As a reminder, all vehicles parked on the street must be moved at least once every 24 hours, regardless of any permission granted or parking permit held.

Residents may purchase monthly overnight permits for parking in front of their homes for a cost of \$30 per month between April 1 and Nov. 30. Parking permits may be purchased at the Police Department between the hours of 8 am and 9 pm or normal business hours. Between Nov. 30 and April 1, overnight parking permits may be purchased at the Police Department for designated areas only.

## Power Outages and New Numbers

### When there are Power Outages:

Please do not call the police department's non-emergency number or administrative number when your power goes out. The village does not provide electrical services and cannot do anything to restore power. Calls regarding power outages can quickly tie up telephone lines to the Bayside Communications Center, answers 9-1-1 and non-emergency calls for Whitefish Bay, which can affect incoming emergency calls and dispatching services.

### New Non-Emergency Number for Police Dispatch

The Bayside Communications Center now dispatches police and fire service for incidents that occur in Whitefish Bay. The new non-emergency number is (414) 351-9900.

The number previously used for non-emergency calls for service will eventually be disconnected. Residents will be informed prior to the disconnection of the old number.

### Leaf and Yard Waste Collection

#### When will leaf pick-up begin?

DPW will begin picking up leaves around mid-October. Specific days are not scheduled for leaf pickup on individual streets. Leaf pick-up is a priority and Staff makes every effort to collect leaves on a weekly basis, but it is dependent on crew availability and the volume of leaves that need collecting.

#### Where do I place my leaves?

Leaves shall be placed near or in the curb of the street. Please place your leaves away from storm inlets as leaf decay can clog storm sewers and add unwanted nutrients to Lake Michigan.

#### Can I throw yard waste in the leaf pile?

We encourage property owners to throw yard waste in the leaf piles to preclude a separate yard waste pick-up. Yard waste is plant material such as flowers and garden material. Branches, sticks and other woody material should not be placed with the leaves and should be left on the boulevard for chipping. The woody material makes composting of the leaves more difficult.

#### What does the Village do with the leaves?

Most of the leaves are temporarily stored and composted at a DNR monitored site shared with the City of Glendale. In the spring the somewhat composted piles are hauled away by a private sod grower and used as bedding material for sod beds.

#### When is the last day that leaves or yard waste will be picked up?

Village crews will begin their last leaf collection on

November 12. To ensure your leaves and yard waste will be picked up in the curb, leaves and yard waste must be raked to the curb by Nov. 12. Leaves raked to the curb after the crews have made their final pass on your street will not be collected and must be bagged or containerized. The DPW will run yard waste crews to pick-up bagged and containerized material until the first significant snow fall or until Nov. 30. Due to Thanksgiving, the trucks and crew used for leaves are used for garbage pick-up and therefore there will be no leaf & yard waste pick-up from Nov. 19 to Nov. 21.

#### Chipping and Yard Waste Material Drop Site

DPW will not be chipping branches after Nov. 30. Chipping will resume in April of 2013. Due to winter conditions, the Village is unable to pick-up leaves, yard waste and chipping material from December to April. If you do have material after Nov. 30 and throughout the winter months you can take and dispose of the material at the Village's transfer station. The transfer station is shared with the Village of Shorewood and is located at 3801 N. Morris Blvd. The transfer station is open from 8 am to 2 pm on:

- \* December-March on the first Saturday of the month
- \* April-November on the first and third Saturday of the month

Fees to use the site are \$10 per car, \$15 per truck, van or SUV, \$5 per additional load with a trailer, and \$75 per multi-axle vehicle or dump truck. No construction or demolition debris will be accepted.

## Recycling Collection Guidelines

Recycled material is collected using a single compartment truck and does not require residents to separate their recyclable material. This material is then transported to a transfer center in Germantown owned by Veolia Environmental Services where it is separated and shipped for processing.

State and local laws require everyone in Wisconsin to recycle. Please visit the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) website for more information. Based on these laws set by the State of Wisconsin, the garbage and recycling collectors may leave a notice that you need to recycle or that they are unable to accept something as recycling. Do not place acceptable recycling items in plastic bags. Please review the list below regarding proper recycling procedures and materials.

### Paper Products

Corrugated boxes should be flattened and cut to a 2 ft x 2 ft size. Please remove plastic food liners from boxes. The following Paper Products are **ACCEPTABLE**:

- Newspaper & Inserts
- Magazines & Books
- Junk Mail & Envelopes
- Phone Books & Catalogs
- Office Paper (any color)
- Corrugated Cardboard
- Paper Grocery Bag

The following Paper Products are **NOT ACCEPTABLE**:

- Tissue Products and Paper Toweling
- Frozen Food Boxes
- Dairy Carton Boxes
- Paper Contaminated with Food Residue or Other Debris
- Pizza Boxes or Carryout Food Wrappers

### Glass Materials

Recycle clear, green, brown, and/or tinted glass. Please rinse out and remove lids and caps. It is not necessary to remove paper labels. The following Glass Materials are **ACCEPTABLE**:

- Any color glass bottles, jug's, or jars
- Glass Beverage & Glass Food Containers

The following Glass Materials are **NOT ACCEPTABLE**:

- Ceramic Items (dishes, vases, cups)
- Drinking Glasses or Crystal
- Light Bulbs
- Window or Auto Glass

### Plastic Materials

Please rinse and remove lids and caps. It is not necessary to remove paper labels. As long as the material falls under the acceptable category, plastic with numbers 1 - 7 may be recycled. The following Plastic Materials are **ACCEPTABLE**:

- Soda Bottles
- Milk & Water Jugs
- Laundry Bottles
- Shampoo, Conditioner, Lotion, & Cosmetic Bottles

The following Plastic Materials are **NOT ACCEPTABLE**:

- Motor Oil & Antifreeze Bottles
- Styrofoam or Microwave Containers
- Plastic Bags Including Grocery Bags
- Medical Supplies
- Plastic Toys, Flower Pots, Garden Plastics
- Pesticide or Herbicide Containers

### Metal Materials

Please rinse all cans. It is not necessary to remove paper labels. The following Metal Materials are **ACCEPTABLE**:

- All Aluminum Cans
- All Steel or Bi-Metal Cans

The following Metal Materials are **NOT ACCEPTABLE**:

- Aluminum Foil & Pie Tins
- Paint Cans & Aerosol Cans
- Car Parts, Nails, & Screws
- Pots & Pans
- Gasoline Cans & Scrap Metal.

Please use paper bag containers or boxes for extra recycling. Contact the Public Works Department at (414) 967-5128 on the availability of an additional container. All items that are NOT ACCEPTABLE should be placed in the garbage.

### Fall Presidential Election Absentee Voting

The Presidential Election will be held on Tuesday, November 6. Polls will open at 7:00 am and will close at 8:00 pm. To find your polling location, visit the Village's website, [www.wfbvillage.org](http://www.wfbvillage.org). Absentee voting is available in the Clerk's Office October 22 through November 2. To accommodate the expected influx of absentee voters, Village Hall will extend hours for Absentee Voting during the week of October 29, as well as Saturday, October 27.

Absentee voting and Voter Registration will be available at Village Hall during the following dates and times:

- Monday – Friday, October 22 – 26: 8 am – 4:30 pm
- Saturday, October 27: 8 am – Noon
- Monday – Thursday, October 29 – November 1: 8 am – 6 pm
- Friday, November 2: 8 am – 5 pm

### Voter Registration

Are you new to Whitefish Bay, moved recently within Whitefish Bay, recently changed your name, never voted, or haven't voted since the 2008 Presidential Election? If so, you must register to vote in order to vote in the November Presidential Election. Registering to vote can be done by mail, in the Clerk's Office, or on Election Day.

### Registration Requirements

- You are a US Citizen and are at least 18 years of age
- Must live in the Village for 28 consecutive days preceding the Election.
- Provide Wisconsin Driver's License Number (if you have one) or last four digits of your social security number if you have **never** been issued a WI Driver's License.
- Provide a proof of residency.

### Firearms Prohibited within Village Facilities

The Village Board amended Ordinance 8.01(1) regarding the discharging and carrying of firearms at its July 11 Village Board meeting. This amendment prohibits the carrying, either concealed or not concealed, within any Village owned facility with the exception of Police Officers. This includes but not limited to the Village Hall, Police Department, Department of Public Works, Library, Fire Station, and structures at Water Tower, Klode, and Cahill parks. The prohibition does not include the parks themselves, but does include the buildings within them. Please contact the Police Department with any questions at (414) 962-3830.

## Do You Have a Treasure from Whitefish Bay's Past?



The **Pabst White Fish Bay Resort Bill of Fare** is from around 1900. It was found by a resident while sorting through a parent's effects. Note that a tasty serving of whitefish – "fresh every day and caught in this Bay" – could be had for 50 cents.

Is there a long-forgotten menu, news story, tax bill,

church bulletin, Bay Leaves or Tower Times (the high school student paper) buried in your drawers? Do you have a photo album you have not looked at in years? Have you unearthed a remnant from Whitefish Bay's past?

## North Shore School for Seniors

The North Shore School for Seniors was founded in 2001 and is in its 11th year of operation. The school has a volunteer Operating Staff and Advisory Committee composed of representatives from various religious denominations in the North Shore suburbs of Milwaukee. The volunteers from the North Shore area carry on the daily operations and all of the classes are taught by volunteer teachers, including some with Ph.D. degrees.

The school is open to all adults in the area over 50 years of age. It offers a wide variety of courses including foreign language, history, current events, literature, music and music appreciation, travelogues, art and art appreciation, and computer courses in a lab consisting of a number of individual work stations. There is a very reasonable tuition charge for each

course. The school operates twenty-four weeks during the year with a fall semester beginning September 10th consisting of two six-week sessions. The winter term starts in January with two six-week sessions. The classes meet on Mondays and Tuesdays at the United Methodist Church of Whitefish Bay. Catalogs, with a list of all the classes offered with additional information, are distributed to participating churches and other outlets in the North Shore area.

# North Shore Health Department

## Dog Bites

The North Shore Public Health Department assists with animal bite and rabies investigations and has noticed an increased number of dog bites this year. With everyone's cooperation and common sense, we can all stay safe!

Did you know that...

4.7 million people in this country are bitten by dogs every year.

Children are by far the most common victims.

800,000 Americans receive medical attention for dog bites each year.

Senior citizens are the second most common dog bite victims.

### What's a dog owner to do?

Don't put your dog in a position where it feels threatened or teased. Remember that dogs are also stressed by heat and crowds. Use common sense before taking your dog into a crowded situation, especially in very hot weather.

Train your dog. Consider completing a Canine Good Citizen test to help you identify situations that may cause stress to your dog.

Use a leash to ensure you are able to control your dog. Ensure that the leash is short enough (no more than 4 feet) to allow you to fully control your dog.

If you have a fenced yard, make sure the gates are secured. Be aware of your dog's location when you open your door; some dogs will bolt out an open door and others will bite to protect their home from "invasion" by a stranger.

### How can you protect your family?

Be cautious around strange dogs, and treat your own pet with respect. Because children are the most common victims of dog bites, parents and caregivers should:

NEVER leave a baby or small child alone with a dog.

Teach children – including toddlers – to be careful around pets. Children must learn not to approach strange dogs or try to pet dogs through fences. Teach children to ask permission from the dog's owner before petting the dog.

Be aware of situations that suddenly put the child in contact with a dog and teach their children to approach even familiar dogs slowly and only with the dog's owner in control.
