## Letter from the Village President

As usual, summer is a busy season in Whitefish Bay. There are multiple construction projects underway, including the recent groundbreaking of the Beaumont Place Apartments, new businesses opening up on Silver Spring, many summer events and the planning and implementation of a new DPW building.

Cahill Park is in the middle of a major renovation designed to improve storm water management. During construction, the tennis courts will be available for use, but not the west half of the park or the parking lot. This facility will provide direct flooding relief to at least 130 homes and will be able to easily retain 5.9 inches of rain in a 24 hour period. The project will also provide approximately 500 residents in the 4700 and 4800 blocks from Marlborough to the west village limits added storm sewer capacity in large storms because of the retention of water at Cahill Park. Friends of Bay Baseball fundraised for an artificial turf infield and new dugouts on the first and third base lines. Having had experience with the turf soccer and football field at the high school, this is going to be a great place both to play ball and support our local teams.

Silver Spring is welcoming some new businesses this spring and summer. The Bay is the newest restaurant to open. They have both inside and outdoor seating, serving everything from salads and burgers, to fish and pizza. There are three other restaurants set to open soon: Vinamo, a tapas and wine restaurant is expected to open in August, Roman Candle Pizza is expected to open in September, and G&S Cupcakes is expected to open in August. Also recently opened are new places to exercise, 9Round and Orange Shoe Fitness. This is in addition to all the businesses that have been on the street for many years. Please, remember to shop local.

The groundbreaking ceremony for the Beaumont Place Apartments was held on May 29th. This project will bring close to 90 luxury apartment units to the Village when completed in November 2014. As with any large construction project, the initial work will be noisy and cause some parking limitations. While some of the parking lots will remain open during the construction process, be aware of the reduced availability for parking and plan accordingly.

The Village Board recently approved the construction of a new DPW facility to be located at the corner of Fairmont and Lydell. This 40,500 square foot facility will

allow the village to own and maintain a facility within the village limits, vacating an 80 year old rented facility in the city of Glendale.

The turf management task force met multiple times this past year to come up with solutions to manage our green space that works for the entire community. They deserve congratulations for taking on this task. Based on their recommendations, we will be teaming up with various civic organizations to maintain most of the village green space without the use of any pesticides. Please see the village website for a complete plan. Volunteers are needed to help maintain the green space.

Enjoy your summer. Remember to attend all the great things going on in WFB; the 4th of July parade, Sounds of Summer, the activities along Silver Spring, and the band concerts and ice cream socials. Be sure to include the new shops and restaurants as well as the existing WFB businesses in your special events plans,

### Cahill Park Progress



The first phase of the storm water basin MR 3 project at Cahill Park is underway with the storm water facility and baseball field improvement construction having begun on May 13th. The rendering depicts what the area is expected to look like upon completion. The new baseball field in the southwest portion of Cahill Park is expected to feature brick dugouts, backstop, built-in bleachers, and a field turf infield.

• The project schedule is ten-

tatively as follows: Excavation work until the week of August 4th.

- Dugouts and bleachers, mid-June through the end of July.
- Retaining walls and stairs, from the end of June through July.
- Parking lot, from the end of July through mid-August.
- Drains, irrigation, and fencing, mid-July through August.
- Field turf and restoration, mid-August through early September.

## North Shore Water Commission Annual Report

Potable water is available to all properties within the Village and is provided by the North Shore Water Commission (NSWC). Glendale, Fox Point, and Whitefish Bay share in the water pumping and purification of Lake Michigan water at the Glendale plant, and each community is responsible for their own infrastructure. The Village does all the water billing for its own residents. Water billing is handled by the Village to account for charges for treatment from

NSWC, capital improvement projects, wages and benefits from employees, and other expenses. The Public Service Commission (PSC) monitors this process. The water system is continually monitored for maintenance and replacement needs to service its residents.

### Fireworks Prohibited

Fireworks can be an exciting way to celebrate the Fourth of July, however fireworks can easily cause fires, severe burns, and even death if not careful. In an effort to promote a safe and enjoyable July Fourth for all residents and guests of Whitefish Bay, the Police Department will enforce WFB Ordinance 8.01(3)(a) and Wisconsin Statute 167.10 prohibiting the possession and/or use of fireworks.

Buying a firework from a vendor in Wisconsin, does not mean it is legal to possess and use in Whitefish Bay. If it leaves the ground or explodes and goes boom, it is not allowed in Whitefish Bay. Sparklers, snakes, and snap bangs are permitted. Bottle rockets, roman candles, and firecrackers are examples of fireworks that are illegal.

Leave the fireworks to the professionals and join us at Klode Park for the Whitefish Bay July Fourth Celebration. Please contact the Police Department with any questions at 414-962-3830.

### North Shore Fire Department

Summer is the peak time of the year for lightning strikes and lightning fires. However, lightning does occur year round. It's important to be prepared for this dangerous weather phenomenon.

#### Outdoor safety:

- If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance of lightning. Look for shelter inside a home, large building, or a hard-topped vehicle right away. Do not go under tall trees for shelter. There is no place outside that is safe during a thunderstorm. Wait at least 30 minutes after the last thunder before leaving your shelter.
- Stay away from windows and doors.
- If you are in or on open water, go to land and seek shelter immediately.
- If you feel your hair stand on end, that means lightning is about to strike, squat low to the ground on the balls of your feet. Place your hands over your ears and your

head between your knees. Make yourself the smallest target possible and minimize your contact with the ground. Do not lie flat on the ground. This is a last resort when a building or hard-topped vehicle is not available.

- If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1 and get medical care immediately. Lightning strike victims carry no electrical charge; attend to them immediately. Check their breathing, heartbeat, and pulse. CPR may be needed.

#### Indoor safety:

- Unplug appliances and other electrical items, like computers, and turn off air conditioners. If you are unable to unplug them, turn them off. Stay off corded phones, computers, and other electronic equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. Avoid washing your hands, bathing, doing laundry, or washing dishes.





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## Historic Preservation Commission

### Mr. McGee's Wild Ride

The following story about Charles McGee, one of Whitefish Bay's early and illustrious residents, was written by the late historian Mimi Bird, as told to her by McGee's widow, Anna, who wasn't aboard the buggy that day but heard all the details.

Today's drivers may suppose traffic problems a modern phenomenon, but they are just different now from what they were in 1903 when Charles McGee, the great grandson of Milwaukee co-founder Solomon Juneau, went for a ride.

The future Mrs. McGee, Anna Meyer, whose father Adolf Meyer was president of the Cream City Brewery, was then a sophomore at Milwaukee-Downer College (today UWM). McGee, who would later serve as Milwaukee County district attorney, second Robert LaFollette's presidential nomination, run for governor of California, and come to the aid of President Teddy Roosevelt after he had been shot in Milwaukee, was married at the time to Anna's sister, Gustave.

After Gustave died of a ruptured appendix, leaving two daughters, Anna and Charles were married. One of Charles' daughters with Gustave, Theiline, later married John McCone, who became chair of the US Atomic Energy Commission, director of the Central Intelligence Agency, and co-founded the Bechtel Group, the largest construction company in the U.S.

But on the June afternoon when Charles McGee headed north from downtown Milwaukee on Prospect Ave. in his carriage, all this lay in the future. With him were his daughter, Betty, 3, and his brother-in-law, John, 15. His plan was to pick up Gustave and Anna at the college for a family gathering. Cars were starting to share the streets with horses. One of them followed close behind the buggy and McGee struggled to hold back his horse which was threatening to run. Just as the motorist turned off on Kane Pl., the horse bolted. McGee hauled back on the lines. The bridle broke. Out of control, the horse galloped down the bluff toward the Northwestern Railway tracks (now Lincoln Memorial Drive). "I heard a train coming and saw the tender lower the gate at

the crossing," McGee said, according to his widow's recollections. "I turned to John and asked him to jump. He had fainted. All I could do was push him to the floor and hope the buggy's dashboard would protect him. I took little Betty by the collar of her dress, leaned out of the buggy, and dropped

ordered him home to bed. "I'll do no such thing," McGee told the doctor and hurried off to see what had happened to his passengers. Both had been lucky. John was only bruised. Betty was unhurt. Meanwhile, McGee's horse, which had hit the train, leaped up and headed south along the

her on a pile of rubbish as we dashed by. The crossing gate loomed close. The horse dashed under it, breaking loose from the buggy.

"I hit the gate full force with my chest, breaking the gate off like a match stick. I was thrown against the moving train. My overcoat caught on a break beam and I was dragged 15 feet or more before it tore and I fell a few inches from the track. I felt as if I had been shot out of a cannon against a stone wall." A trolley had stopped to wait for the train. A doctor onboard hurried over, decided McGee had no broken bones – later it was discovered several ribs had been cracked – and

railroad right-of-way to the Northwestern Depot. Several men tried to grab the horse but it shook them off, galloped out on the breakwater and jumped in the lake. Someone called the life-saving station and a crew launched a longboat and started chasing the horse. The sailors caught up with the horse about a thousand feet beyond the breakwater and eventually tied a rope to the horse and forced it to swim back to shore. And so it all turned out happily that wild afternoon of 1903. McGee procured another carriage and took his group to the family party.


