

CHANGES TO STORMWATER UTILITY BILLS

OVER THE PAST few months, the Village has received an overwhelming number of requests to have stormwater utility bills combined with water/sewer utility bills.

Currently, residents receive bills for water/sewer charges tri-annually and bills for stormwater utility charges twice a year in July and December. Beginning in October 2014, user charges for water and sewer and annual stormwater fees will be combined onto one bill that residents will receive three times a year.

In July 2014, residents received a stormwater bill for the first part of the year. Beginning in October 2014, residents will receive one utility bill with charges for their water/sewer usage and a stormwater charge for the second half of 2014. This will allow the Village to "catch-up" and get the water/sewer and stormwater charges onto the same billing cycle. Beginning in 2015, residents

will see 1/3 of their annual stormwater fee on each water/sewer bill rather than a separate stormwater bill for 1/2 of their annual stormwater fee.

For example, a property with one (1) Equivalent Residential Unit (ERU) has an annual stormwater fee of \$100.00. Previously, the resident received a bill in July for \$50.00 and a bill in December for \$50.00. Going forward, when that same property receives their tri-annual water/sewer bill, they will see a stormwater charge for 1/3 their annual charge, or \$33.33.

Below is a table that serves as an example of Stormwater charges in 2014 and 2015 (that does not include usage charges for water/sewer):

The event was moved to Schoolhouse Park in 1987 after thousands of people came to view the pumpkins tying up traffic from Lake Drive to I-43 and all along Marlborough Drive.

ARE YOU GOING to be out of town, or simply would just like to vote absentee for the General Election on November 4th?

Request an Absentee Ballot by Mail or Email

You can download an absentee ballot application under election information via our quick links section on our homepage, www.wfbvillage.org. You may also stop into the clerk's office and request an application. Lastly, you may request a ballot be sent to you by sending an email to c.brustmann@wfbvillage.org. Your application must be received no later than 5pm on Thursday, October 30, in order for an absentee ballot to be sent to you.

In-Person at the Clerk's Office (Early Voting)

You can also vote absentee at the Village Hall clerk's office Monday through Friday 8am-4:30pm, between October 20 and October 31. In-person absentee voting occurs two weeks before any election, ending at 5pm on the Friday before the election.

Deadline for Returning Your Absentee Ballot

Your completed absentee ballot must be postmarked no later than Election Day and received by the assistant clerk no later than 4pm on the Friday after the election.

Election Inspectors Needed

The Village wants your help! We are looking for individuals interested in becoming election inspectors for upcoming elections. Election inspectors work from 6:30am to the close of the polls at 8pm. We have four different voting locations and placement would depend on the need for election inspectors.



REMEMBERING THE ROSENBERG/FROEDTERT HOUSE

FORMER WHITEFISH BAY RESIDENTS who owned some of the grand homes found in the village sometimes differ in what they leave as a legacy. Take the one-time owners of the Rosenberg/Froedtert House at 5200 N. Lake Dr.

This expansive Tudor Revival residence sits on an extensive lot abutting Lake Michigan with a magnificent vista of the lake. The structure is lannon stone and brick, with some half-timbering and stucco at the second floor. The home originally consisted of twelve rooms and a three-car garage. The residence was formerly part of the site of the Pabst Whitefish Bay Resort which closed in 1914.

When the home was constructed in 1927 for Benjamin and Anna Rosenberg, the couple was very concerned about privacy so that they went out of their way to avoid disclosing they were the owners. In one example, they

listed the original ownership documents under a third party. Benjamin Rosenberg was the president of The Grand women’s apparel shop, which was later operated by his son and then sold to a New York firm before closing in 1966.

The Lake Drive residence was sold in 1943 to Kurtis R. Froedtert, chairman of the board and president of the Froedtert Grain and Malting Company. He had a substantial addition added to the west side of the home in 1943.

Part of Kurtis Froedtert’s legacy lives on today with a generous bequest that led to the construction of Froedtert

Hospital in Wauwatosa after his death.

An intensive architecture and history survey was conducted in Whitefish Bay between 2010 and 2011 that determined the house to be an “Individually Eligible for Listing in the National Register of Historic Places.” The intensive survey noted the house as an exceptional example of Tudor Revival styling, with a stone and half-timbered exterior and a slate roof.

Designed by Richard Philipp, this residence clearly exemplifies his ability as a designer of merit. A portion of the second level is distinguished by a stucco and

stone exterior with half-timber exposed framing accents, clearly the work of master craftsmen. Philipp designed other homes in Whitefish Bay, including the Tudor Revival Herman Reel House at 4640 N. Lake Dr. and was involved in designing Holy Hill Basilica in Hubertus.

In discussing Philipp’s works, architectural historian Richard W. E. Perrin said that it is in “the adaptation of the Tudor English forms that Richard Philipp’s ability as a designer was most evident. Some of his most important houses of mansion proportions were designed by him for prominent families throughout Wisconsin.”

The Singer Family:



HOW DOES a community like Whitefish Bay engage in our 21st century globalized society? Not only do their travel experiences benefit the UWM campus, but they add to the already strong global-mindedness of Milwaukee and Whitefish Bay.

“One of the benefits of living in a community like Whitefish Bay is the international consciousness of its residents,” Jen says, also a former Peace Corps volunteer. “Many in our community have lived or traveled abroad, have worked with people from other places or work for multi-national companies. As an educated community we assume the

importance of multiculturalism. Knowledge of language, travel and culture is vital to any community.” And Jen has been fortunate enough to visit countries with many citizens who cherish the same values. Amongst Jen’s favorite countries are Thailand, Azerbaijan and Turkey. Jen highly values the international contribution to UWM and the larger community and is delighted to help bring those students and scholars here.

The very same qualities that Jen voices are similarly exuded by Alan, who is focused on teaching Honors students, courses based on the humanities and global-mindedness. Of his many courses, he teaches “The Idea of the Nation” and “The Idea of Progress.” Alan publishes in his specialty, the history of the Jewish community in Great Britain in the modern era. Alan has firsthand experience, as he writes, researches, and delivers lectures in Great Britain. He brings those experiences back to UWM, where he challenges high-achieving students to focus on their writing and critical thinking.

While at times Alan and Jen are found traveling, they never lose

sight of their very own family and community within Whitefish Bay, especially as proud parents of their seven year old twins, Felix and Annabelle. In fact, both children are already following in their parents footsteps here at home. Even as a seven year old, Felix is a budding author who wrote a book about the Civil War, a project that had its beginning as an Abraham Lincoln lesson at Cumberland Elementary School. Annabelle is very socially minded, as an admirer of Martin Luther King, Jr., making sure to celebrate Dr. King's birthday each year. In addition to Annabelle's social mindedness, she is wonderfully creative as she loves all types of art and crafts.

Even the family pet, a fourteen

year old cat named Ticky, has somewhat of a worldly appeal as he has been mistaken for an animal found in exotic places outside of the Midwest. "He has been mistaken for a panther on more than one occasion!" Jen says. Okay, so maybe that just means he's a large cat, but at least it's apropos to UWM's mascot, the UWM Panthers.

Whether helping Felix or Annabelle care for a cat or in spearheading family projects, Jen and Alan not only make a point of enriching their own children's lives, but are highly connected to their neighborhood. The Singers love that there are so many kids on their block and how everyone is family oriented. The Singers especially love their block party,

where this year Alan played guitar with his high school band. Aside from Alan, the rest of the band members traveled from suburban Chicago, where Alan grew up, to entertain the Kent Avenue block party. The Singer family also loves to connect with fellow residents through coach-pitch baseball, sponsored by the Whitefish Bay Recreation and Community Education Department.

Love for family and community is easily fostered in a place like Whitefish Bay. Jen adds, "Our favorite thing about Whitefish Bay is the school system. Education is extremely important to us, and we are very pleased with our experience. All of the teachers have been wonderful,

and we appreciate everyone. The principal of Cumberland Elementary, Ms. Heffron, is amazing. She is so committed to the well-being of students and families, and clearly cares about their success."

Our own Whitefish Bay schools also promote global-mindedness through projects, as each grade level spends almost an entire school year investigating a specific country. Last school year in first grade, Felix's class researched India and Annabelle's class studied her dad's favorite place, England. This is consistent with the philosophy of the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, that "Globally

competent individuals are aware, curious, and interested in learning about the world and how it works," a point never far from the Singers' minds, even when they are immersed in the local community. Both Alan and Jen agree. They look forward to the day when they can take their kids abroad with them, as they strongly believe that international travel is important to becoming a globally minded citizen.

In doing so, perhaps Jen and Alan's own children, and hopefully everyone else in the Whitefish Bay community, will reach the amazing experiences that can only be had with travel, from global perspectives to anecdotal accounts.

Jen relayed how her own personal experiences led to deep connections to our very own Whitefish Bay community even

while overseas. In 2006, Jen was in Ankara, Turkey, representing UWM. Among the US consulate officials in Ankara was a woman originally from Whitefish Bay. "She had not been home in a few years and was very homesick. We had recently purchased our home, and I happened to have photos of it. When I showed them to her, she actually teared up and said she actually knew the specific house. She had grown

up here and had even gone to Whitefish Bay High School."

The Singers strongly believe that global-mindedness and love of one's own community go hand in hand. It is through participation in the global society that the Singers hope to make this world a better place, both here and abroad. •



WORKING SMOKE ALARMS SAVE LIVES: TEST YOURS EVERY MONTH

THE NATIONAL Fire Protection Association (NFPA) is preparing to kick off its 2014 Fire Prevention Week Campaign. This year's theme is "Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives: Test Yours Every Month," which emphasizes the importance of having working smoke detectors that are able to provide early warning in the event of a fire.

The NFPA provides startling statistics related to smoke detectors, including:

- Almost three of five (60%) reported home fire deaths in 2007 to 2011 resulted from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.
- Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in half.
- In fires considered large enough to activate the smoke alarm, hardwired alarms operated 93% of the time, while battery powered alarms operated only 79% of the time. In addition, when smoke alarms fail to operate, it is usually because batteries are missing, disconnected, or dead. While the NFPA and North Shore Fire/Rescue do not generally recommend a specific brand

of smoke detector, we do provide the following information to make shopping a little easier:

An ionization smoke alarm is generally more responsive to flaming fires and a photoelectric smoke alarm is generally more responsive to smoldering fires. For the best protection, or where extra time is needed to awaken or assist others, both types of alarms, or combination ionization and photoelectric alarms are recommended.

It is imperative that every smoke detector gets tested at least once a month. Testing a smoke alarm can and should be a family event. It is a great time to incorporate reviewing and practicing your home escape/evacuation plan and ensuring everyone understands where the designated meeting spot is in the event of a fire.

North Shore Fire/Rescue firefight-



ers will be traveling to most North Shore area elementary schools during the month of October to provide grade specific fire prevention education. North Shore Fire/Rescue encourages every

family to reserve some extra time during the month of October to discuss fire prevention and education topics at home.
