A Home Repair Headache Could Be Hanging Right Over your Head

Winters in Wisconsin can provide a wide range of weather. From un-seasonal warmth to heavy snow, the winter can be packed with plenty of surprises. A cold weather culprit that could become a problem following a snowstorm is ice damming on top of a home. Ice dams develop when heat from a home rises up through a roof covered with several inches of snow and melts the bottom snow layer – creating an icy buildup.

“Ice dams are lumps of ice that form on gutters, eaves and valleys, and prevent melting snow from running down,” says local Allstate agent Andrew McCabe. “As the snow melts, the water backs up and seeps under shingles or tiles and eventually into your home. Preventing ice

dams can be as simple as mounting proper insulation and avoiding improper removal of ice and snow.”

To help minimize ice dam formation on your roof and protect your home from winter damage, Andrew McCabe offers the following tips:

- Keep gutters and downspouts clear of leaves and natural debris.
- Identify areas of heat loss in your attic and properly insulate them to prevent heat from escaping.
- Minimize heat loss through the attic by wrapping or insulating all heating ductwork.

- Avoid using sharp tools or ice picks, which can damage roofs, on gutters or downspouts. Use a snow rake or soft broom to clear fresh snowfall from gutters.
- Contact a professional snow removal company to clear existing ice dams.
- Avoid falling icicles or avalanching snow. Avoid getting on the roof and working on a ladder or beneath a roof that has accumulated large amount of snow.

Construction of the radio station will be funded by contributions from individuals and businesses that realize that a radio station will contribute wonderfully to our community. This is the same way the baseball and softball field projects were completed.

The station is planning for live coverage of Blue Dukes games, live broadcasts of school concerts and other events in the village, plus individuals will host music programs and more!

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


Join Emmy Award-Winning Actor John McGivern as he explores living, working and playing in Whitefish Bay.

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The Toll Family Combines Love of Biking and Camping Into One Adventure



While the cold winter temperatures in Wisconsin force many residents to hang up their bicycles for the season, Mike and Crystal Toll are still willing to bear the cold and bike outside. The Toll family is an extremely active family that believes one should take care of their body, and go explore the great outdoors.

Having both grown up in Shorewood, Mike and Crystal first started dating in high school when both were on the track team as middle-distance runners. The two continued to date from 1996 through their college years at UW-Madison. It was in college that both walked onto the UW Rowing teams, while also focusing on their academics. Mike majoring in mechanical engineering, and Crystal earning her degree in psychology, and then continuing on to earn her masters in physical therapy. The couple were engaged in 2001, and wed in 2003 back in their hometown of Shorewood.

Their first house purchased together was in Shorewood, until 2009 when they moved to their current house in Whitefish Bay. "We purchased a house in Whitefish Bay for many reasons. The great schools, charming older homes and streets with large trees, and sidewalks for running and walking with our family. We like being in a community that is walkable, close to downtown, and close enough to work, especially since my husband often bikes to work," said Crystal.

Since starting his career, Mike has always ridden his bike to work regularly, with his current ride being 9 miles each way. "Each winter, he makes a goal to ride his bike to work on at least one of the coldest days of the winter season. Last year that occurred when he rode his bike into work when it was -15°F, yes 15° below zero! I was a little worried he would get frostbite, but luckily he wore the appropriate gear to prevent it," said Crystal.

Biking has always been a cornerstone for the couple, and a tradition they have passed down to their children, Lauren (9), Miles (7), and Tanner (5). The couple have always taken what is known as bike camping trips since they were married. "Bike camping means we ride our bikes to camping sites, typically Mauthe Lake near Kettle Moraine, carrying all our camping gear on our bikes, and after the trip is over, we bike back home. We carried this tradition on with our kids, pulling them in Burleys when they were small, and now they ride behind in a tag-a-long bike trailer," said Mike.

Aside from bike camping, the family also competes in numerous other fitness events. Each July the entire family does a triathlon, where the kid race is on a Saturday, and the

adult race is on a Sunday. All three of the Toll children completed their first triathlon the summer after they turned three, and continue to complete a triathlon every summer since.

In 2002, Mike and a group of cyclist rode over 5,000 miles in 93 days on their bicycles. The group started in Washington and traveled to Maine, all while biking and carrying their camping gear on their bicycles. "That was a wonderful experience for me and only grew my love of bicycle touring. It might have fueled the flame for my current goal, being to bike the perimeter of the U.S.," said Mike. He has already finished the entire northern boarder and the West Coast, with his last trip taking him from California to Texas. To date, Mike has completed 8,000 miles of the perimeter, with 4,600 miles still left to finish. "My plan is to return to Texas in a few years to resume the southern route and then head up to the East Coast to finish. I would love to take the family with me for different legs of the trip, but that means waiting until the kids are old enough to do so," said Mike.

While biking is Mike's passion, Crystal has a love for running and completed 15 marathons and 3 Ironman triathlons. An Ironman is a 2.4 mile swim, followed by a



112-mile bicycle ride, and finishing with a full 26.2 mile marathon race. "Ironically out of the three Ironmans I have completed, my personal best time was in 2015, almost a decade after competing in my first one and 3 kids later! Goes to show that being older and having more life obligations doesn't mean that your fitness needs to decrease," said Crystal.

The Toll family proves that with the right attire and gear, outdoor adventures can be had even during the cold Wisconsin winters. ●



RADON-induced Lung Cancer

Indoor radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer after smoking. According to the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) radon-induced lung cancer kills 21,000 Americans every year! Smoking combined with radon exposure poses additional lifetime risks of getting lung cancer.

If you want to start the year off healthy, do it from the ground up and test your home for radon. Radon is a naturally occurring, cancer-causing radioactive gas that is present in the ground and can enter homes through their foundations. It forms naturally from the decay of radioactive elements which are found at different levels in soil and rock around the base and under the home. Radon levels vary from home to home, the only way to know if you have high levels is to test.

Radon levels are usually highest in the basement and levels peak in the winter months when windows and doors are closed that would otherwise help to vent the gas. To assess the magnitude of the problem in your home, it is, therefore, best to test in the winter months.

Radon is present everywhere and no area of the country is free from risk. Radon levels are easily measured with a short-term test kit that you can get from the North Shore Health Department. A short-term test kit is placed in the lowest livable area of your home after all the windows and doors have been closed. The test remains in place for 2-3 days and measures the level of radon in your home. The EPA recommends that you re-test your home if levels are $\geq 4\text{pCi/L}$. If the results are high after your second test your home may require mitigation.

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
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

Caring for Something in Your Home That You Use Almost Everyday...

Doing laundry is most likely part of just about everyone's daily routine. But, did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? According to the National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA), the leading cause of clothes washer and dryer fires is failure to clean and properly maintain them. North Shore Fire/Rescue responds to a number of these fires every year.

By following a few simple safety steps, you can help prevent a clothes washer or dryer fire in your home:

Dryers should be properly grounded.

Check the outdoor vent flap to make sure it is not covered by snow.

Keep the area around your dryer clear of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing.

Clothes that come in contact with flammable substances, like gasoline, paint thinner, or similar solvents should be laid outside to dry, then can be washed and dried as usual.

- Always have your washer or dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- NEVER use the dryer without a lint filter in place.
- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Be sure to also remove any lint that has collected around the drum.
- Rigid metal venting is best for proper venting and cleaning; however, if you should choose to use the flexible vent, it is important you replace the tubing regularly to prevent dangerous lint build up. The solid metal venting can be removed and cleaned using a vacuum hose. Professional duct cleaning services also typically offer relatively inexpensive cleaning of dryer vent tubing.
- Keep the dryer in good working order. Gas dryers should be inspected by a professional to make sure that the gas line and connection are intact and free of leaks. NEVER use the dryer or any electrical or flame operated appliances if you smell natural gas. CALL 911 IMMEDIATELY!

- Be sure that the right plug and outlet are used and that the machine is connected properly per manufacturer recommendations.
- Never overload the dryer. If you find that the unit is not drying as effectively, try reducing the amount of clothing you dry at once. If the problem persists; call a service professional to examine the machine.
- **MOST IMPORTANTLY:** Turn off the dryer if you leave home or when you go to bed. Also, always be sure you have a working smoke and carbon monoxide alarm within 10-15 feet of the laundry area. ●



New Year Companion Animal Checklist

Every January 1, we make lots of resolutions and promises to ourselves about being healthier, losing weight or saving more. We often forget about our animals on a daily basis, so this year we are sending out a checklist for those who own companion animals to remind them of the important things that are so often overlooked:

- ✓ Do you have a dog or a cat? On January 1 you are required to have a new license for your pet. Your dog or cat will need to be up to date on rabies, so make an appointment with your vet or at MADACC or Wisconsin Humane Society for a low cost vaccine.
- ✓ Did you get a puppy for a holiday gift? Make sure to sign your puppy up for training classes. Animals that are well socialized and have some training class experience are less likely to bite as adults

and are more confident members of the family.

- ✓ Is your animal overweight? Just like people, overweight animals can suffer other associated health problems. Diet and exercise are the factors that contribute to weight gain and addressing those issues now can help you help your best friend fight the battle of the bulge. Check with your veterinarian about better diet choices and appropriate exercises. Getting out more for walks and playtime is beneficial to both dogs and their owners. Cutting off table scraps is also imperative (even though it can be hard to resist those begging eyes!) for a healthy pet.
- ✓ Most people feel that if an animal appears healthy an annual vet visit is optional. Having a vet exam every year is a very important part of owning an

animal. While it might seem like an unnecessary expense, not discovering a possible underlying medical condition early can cost far more down the line. Many animals can mask pain and often do not let us know about health issues until they are severe. It is a smart idea to put some money aside each month to ensure you have funds for your pet's annual check-up and any emergencies.

If you need help caring for your animal, or have questions about where to bring your animal for training, medical care, or if you need help re-homing an animal, please contact either Wisconsin Humane Society (www.wihumane.org) or Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission (www.madacc.org). Both organizations are here to help and provide referral services and their own services to the community. ●

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
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
